Banana bread 🍌

Ingredients

125g butter, softened

4 cup caster sugar

2 eggs

1 cup mashed banana (about 2 large bananas)

1 tsp vanilla essence

1 tsp bicarbonate of soda

2 tbsp of milk

1 % of plain flour

1 tsp baking powder

Method

- 1. Preheat the oven to 180C. Grease 20 cm round cake tin and line the base with baking paper.
- 2. Beat butter and sugar until light and fluffy.
- 3. Beat in the eggs one at a time. Stir in the bananas and vanilla essence until combined.
- 4. Mix the bicarbonate of soda and milk together before stirring into the banana mixture. Sift the baking powder and fold into mixture until combined.
- 5. Spoon mixture into prepared tin and smooth the top. Bake for 40-45 minutes until cooked. Stand for 5-10 minutes before inverting onto a wire rake to cool.

German Shepherds - They are a great family and guard dog. They're very alert, confident and loyal. They are quite big dogs so if you love playing and running this is the dog for you!




Training tips: How to get your dog to sit

This is Alice's new puppy Fern, a Frenchie. She's 14 weeks old and she loves playing with her toy twiggy!




Kakariki: The Cat In The Hat





Animals and Nature: A Lion's Lockdown

The lion is a large muscular, deep-chested cat with a short, rounded head and round ears. An adult male has a permanent mane that is the most recognisable feature of this species. An average male lion can grow between 184cm and 208cm and a female lion can grow between 160cm and 184cm. Lions also form prides which they live in.

Some large males weigh over 250kg. Today, wild lions live in sub-Saharan Africa and in Asia. Lions are adapted for life in grasslands and mixed areas with trees and grass. The relatively small females are fast runners over short distances and coordinate their hunting of herd animals. In ancient times, lions roamed nearly every continent.



Ten fun facts

- 1. Lions usually live in groups of 10-15 animals called prides.
- 2. An adult male's roar can be heard up to 8km away.
- 3. A female lion needs up to 5kgs of meat a day and a male needs 7kgs or more.
- 4. The name of a baby lion is a cub, whelp or lionet.
- 5. Lions go on the hunt for food mostly from dusk till dawn.
- 6. Female lions do 85-90% of the prides hunting, whilst the male lions patrol the territory and protect the pride.
- 7. In the wild, lions live for an average of 12 years and up to 16 years. They live up to 25 years in captivity.

- 9. Often known as the 'king of the jungle', most lions actually live in the savannah or grasslands. Just *one* population of wild
 - population of wild forest-dwelling lions remains, in Gir Forest National Park, India.
- 10. Female lions reach two-thirds of their adult size by the time they are two years old.
