### Te Ao Maori Experience: Week 5: Thursday 8th and Friday 9th November



Exploring our local curriculum and environment through a Te Aō Māori lens. Activities include:





Auckland Museum visit (Monday October 9th, first day of term 4!) - Ākonga will experience first hand the significance of the marae within Te Ao Māori. Ākonga will develop an understanding of the importance of tikanga and how they can apply it to their everyday lives

### Surfing - Orewa Beach
















Week 6, November 16th

Our popular 'Beach Safety Days' give students the confidence to be active and have fun in the ocean through the enjoyment of learning how to surf.








































### Ponsonby Primary School - Parental Involvement in EOTC activities



- Parents know what is expected of them

# EOTC (Education Out of The Classroom)

### Why camp?

Camp gives us a chance to provide an outdoor learning experience in a safe and supported environment. At Camp Motutapu we are provided with expertise, tools and resources not available at school to be able to teach the children exciting new skills and raise their self-confidence.





# The Camp Experience



Within the camp setting, children develop a sense of independence as they try new adventures away from home.

School camps are known for providing a safe environment where children gain self-confidence as they learn new skills.

It is a great chance for the children to push themselves outside their comfort zones in an environment outside of the classroom.

But most of all, it's fun and will be a memorable event that the children will never forget!



### Risk disclosure

Due to the active nature of the camp and sailing and in the interests of safety, it is important that we obtain information regarding your child's medical and physical needs.

Also, due to the physical nature of the activities and equipment risks, are involved. Although measures have been taken to manage and minimise these, incidents may occur. The staff prepare RAMs (risk analysis plans signed off by the BOT) to minimise risk.

Paperwork will be coming home with your child and will be available on the school website towards the end of term 3.



# Camp Activities



Children will experience a range of activities including:

Walking, rock walls, high ropes course, low ropes course, kayaking, stand up paddle boarding, yachting, night games, swimming, dormitory sleeping, beach exploration, confidence course (including flying fox). Sailing involves swimming and capsizing.


(these activities are yet to be confirmed and some are weather dependent)











## What we need for this to happen:

Awesome parent volunteers! We already have our team of teachers but we need parents to help out too.

We need parents to work with groups of children and we also need some help in the kitchen. To ensure we have correct ratios for supervision we will need 10 parents (for activities) plus 2 parents (for kitchen) funded. A further 8 fee paying parents are welcome if interested.



# Expectations of Parent helpers:

Parents know what is expected of them and ensure that parents sign a parent agreement document prior any overnight activity involving the children.

All parents and teachers and camp experts are police vetted.

Parents are aware that no alcohol is consumed on school trips and no smoking at child centered activities. Cell phones not acceptable when running an event and cell phone coverage is poor.

If any parent helper's behaviour is deemed inappropriate by the trip leader, the trip leader has the Board's power to act, including the right to ask the parent helper to leave.

Most importantly when you are a camp helper you are not on holiday- you are there to help to make this a truly memorable experience for all the children not just your own. We especially ask that parents do not run around after their own child/children.





#### **Activities-**

A teacher is at each event and the parent must be able to work as a team member with the camp expert and teacher. We really need high cooperation, team-playing parents who will follow instructions given by teachers or instructors. Please make sure you fill in the forms correctly. We need to know your previous camp experience and your skills.

12 funded parents- 10 for activities and 2 for being in the kitchen These parents will be selected with consideration given to long term school involvement e.g. PPSG, Sports coaching, BOT (as well as parents having the requisite skills for the activities).

After we have selected the funded parents, we will draw out of the hat 8 parents who can pay to go. These parents will be allocated to a group as an extra support person and have the same role as a funded parent, to meet our Health & Safety requirements. Unsuccessful parents will then be waitlisted in order of draw. The cost is approximately \$185.00 per parent, however, costs will be finalised later in the term when budgets are confirmed.

This process provides 22 parents in total, then we have teachers and camp experts as well.

# Clothing/equipment list

#### Camp- everything has to be sealed for biosecurity

#### One day pack with:

- Sun block, and insect repellent
- If students are hay fever sufferers please bring antihistamines
- Asthmatics please bring medication such as asthma inhalers.
- rain jacket
- brimmed hat
- Wednesday morning tea and lunch
- A named refillable drink bottle

#### Please have all items named.

Children and adults attending need plates and cutlery- please can plates and cups be plastic or metal (camping gear) and drink bottles have wide mouth opening.

All children need a good raincoat.

#### One larger night bag with:

- 2<sup>nd</sup> drink bottle
- pillow and pillowcase
- sleeping bag
- towels (at least 2)
- roll of toilet paper
- 2 tea towels, preferably ones you don't care if they are not returned
- 1x plate (plastic or metal), 1 bowl, cutlery (knife, fork, spoon), 1x cup
- shorts
- t-shirts
- warm clothing for evenings
- sleeping gear
- togs
- sturdy comfortable walking shoes + 1 spare pair of shoes
- own wetsuit (optional and named)
- book, cards, crossword books, etc no electronic toys
- Torch

# Sleeping Arrangements/First Aid





- Fathers sleep in the boys' dorm and mothers in girls' dorm. (Minimum 5 per night)
- Others can sleep in dorms beside the sleeping quarters.
- Teachers are not in the dorms at night. Sanjay is on call.
- FIRST AIDER IS Sanjay parents and teachers do carry out simple first aid.



# Food and baking

Camp site related costs: \$70.00


Instructors & adult ratio cover: \$30.00 a day
